### DRONFIELD TOWN COUNCIL September 2013 OUTSIDE SERVICES FOREMANS REPORT

Litter Bins – The Dog and Litter bins continue to be emptied on a weekly basis.

Grass Cutting - The grass cutting continues with all areas being cut on a fortnightly basis.

**Footpaths** – All the footpaths have been strimmed and cut back where required and any shrub/bushes cut back also, this will continue on a fortnightly basis, so all areas have been done before the weather changes.

**Culverts** - The culverts along the Leabrook valley area are being inspected on a weekly basis.

Flower Beds – The Towns flower beds are being well looked after, they are inspected and deweeded when required.

The flower beds have now been emptied of all summer plants (mid sept) and being prepared ready for the winter bedding plants.

The flower bed opposite the White Swan is being kept clear of plants so that the Outside Service staff can rotovate and weed kill over the next few months as this bed is prone to having a lot of chick weed growing in the bed.

**Hanging Baskets** – All the hanging baskets have been taken down from the lighting columns from around the Town.

Cliffe Park – 4 new lamp posts have been installed next to the path leading up to Gosforth Lodge.

Play areas – Maintenance continues on the play areas.

#### Various Other Tasks -

A bench was installed at Jubillee Park which consisted of a concrete plinth being laid and a bench installed, which was purchased by a member of the public.

The area around the Beacon at Sindlefingen Park has again been deweeded and the area around the Beacon tidied up.

Various tasks around the Town have also been done.

A new dog bin has been resited within the area of Quoit Green.

Goal posts were installed at beginning of September and football season is now under way, there are 6 teams playing on Coal Aston football pitches and 2 teams playing on Dronfield Woodhouse pitches.

The old matting from the Muga pitch has been cut down into 3 meter lengths and cleaned of all sand. This matting will be used on the grass at Library Gardens for Remembrance Sunday and Christmas lights switch on.

PAT Testing has been completed on all DTC owned electrical equipment.

#### Ladies and Gentlemen


The Town Clerk and team administrate bookings for the Peel Centre and Coal Aston Village Hall which provides and excellent service to the community. In May 2015 we expect that the Dronfield Hall Barn community building will also be available for lettings and owner/operators The Dronfield Heritage Trust would like the Town Council to consider extending the service to this building. There will be 3 internal letting spaces — The Heritage and Information Centre, The Gallery and The Education Room on very much the same terms as the Peel Centre. The trust also now has a 22 year lease on the land which joins the back of the barn to Sainsbury car park. This will have a path from the public parking spaces to the barn and be managed as a site of natural history conservation. Occasionally this will be used for town festivals and similar so there will be charges here as well.

We hope you will agree that the 1000's of hours of volunteer time that has gone into turning this derelict site into a community asset should be rewarded by the support of The Town Council. Our final Heritage Lottery application for £1.2m, most of which will flow through the local economy, is due in at the end of October and we would appreciate your response before then.



Welcome to this special edition of Dronfield Heritage Project News. Our team are now busy completing the final details of our Heritage Lottery bid, due for submission in early November. We will learn in March 2014, 3 months later than originally expected, whether we can proceed with the renovation and extension work at Dronfield Hall Barn.

If we get the green light our new Heritage and Arts Centre will be open to the public in early 2015.

Thanks to project development funding from Heritage Lottery, other local donors and the work of our fantastic team of volunteers, it has been a busy year and significant progress has been made across all areas of the project. Over 1600 members of the community aged 8 to 80 have enjoyed opportunities to engage with our exciting heritage! Schools, societies and Friends members have taken part in vital activity surveys. This issue brings you a vibrant illustrated article following a month of archaeological investigations at Hall Barn. We announce the launch of our website, congratulate the Friends on their first anniversary and discover how the science of tree ring dating can help David Hey with his medieval research.



Polunteers, professionals and Friends committee members have worked together tirelessly over the last few months in preparation for our Heritage Lottery Funding bid. From architecture and activity planning to school visits and website creation, progress has been exciting and varied. We now hope to submit our £1million bid in November to transform Hall Barn into a vibrant centre for heritage, natural history and arts activities.

These illustrations, taken from our Interpretation Plan by Button & Co, show for the first time how Dronfield's new hub for intellectual and creative pursuits could look. Internally, the redeveloped building will house a local heritage centre featuring images and artefacts from Dronfield's diverse archive. A small servery will enable visitors to enjoy light refreshment

Upstairs, a striking gallery and functions space will sit beneath majestic medieval timbers. Our modern extension will add a new dimension to Hall Barn. An archive storage facility will sit alongside a significant education room for workshops and research. Externally, visitors will take a sweeping path from Sainsbury's car park into the heart of a landscaped heritage garden featuring a flowery mead and parterre. We hope visitors throughout the community will enjoy sharing our vision for the future!

#### Digitising Dronfield's Archive

At the heart of Dronfield Heritage Project is our information digitisation and archive collection. Since November 2012, volunteers from the Old Dronfield Society and Heritage Trust have been working together to scan and record over 400 old photographs, postcards, newspaper articles, school log books and metal industry catalogues from an archive of over 7000 items.


This process will transform Dronfield's historic records, helping make previously unseen heritage material accessible to all whilst protecting and preserving important information for the future.

A pilot sample of 250 images and documents have now been loaded into a test search facility. This enables the Trust to check how user friendly the system will be for researchers, school students and the community at large. As the project develops we hope to release the online facility for public use. HD screens inside the completed Heritage Centre will also enable all members of the community to view the striking results of this work through themed exhibitions and interactive displays.

#### A Vision for the Future: Activities and Events

At the beginning of July, all 255 members of the Dronfield Hall Barn Friends group were contacted either by email or post and invited to take part in our activity development questionnaire. Creating an Activity Plan is a vital element of our Heritage Lottery bid and sets out a vision for community involvement with heritage, natural history and arts over the next four years.

A significant number of questionnaires were completed and returned, providing usable data to support proposals and ideas for a wide range of activities and events. 71 questionnaires were analysed and incorporated into a substantial draft Activity Plan which will be assessed by our Heritage Lottery case officer ahead of final submission in November.


#### Activity Themes: Your Opinions

Testing community interest regarding proposed uses of the finished building was an important factor in the questionnaire. Friends were asked to select their top five preferences from 18 potential activity themes and function ideas suggested by the Heritage Trust, local groups, societies and individuals.


Results showed a strong desire for social history themed events with art exhibitions following close behind. Your opinions demonstrate the importance of combining heritage and arts in the completed Centre. 40% of respondents selected at least one heritage theme (red), with 34% choosing creative suggestions (grey) and 26% indicating their interest in functions, information and training courses (green).

The questionnaire also asked Friends to choose their top three preferences from a list of five clearly developed activity proposals. Results showed a definite interest in two of these: an annual arts festival and Christmas fair. It is hoped Dronfield can complement existing events in Chesterfield and Sheffield by focusing on the needs of the town and its community.

Volunteers have provided vital support throughout our first year of test events.


Five future volunteering opportunities were suggested in the questionnaire. These have been developed during activity planning and represent a range of involvement, from communicating with visitors at an information desk to hands on heritage carpentry. 76% of those taking part in the questionnaire expressed interest in volunteering for at least one of the suggested activities.





In a cold and snowy March, the first archaeological activity began at Hall Barn. Archaeological Research Services Ltd (ARS) were on site conducting a full historic building recording. This process captures pre-conversion information about the context, chronology and historic uses of a building. At Dronfield Hall Barn ARS created a written, drawn and photographic record of the Grade II\* listed building to English Heritage Level 3 standards. Amongst their aims, the archaeologists hoped to confirm the date, character and significance of the possible medieval floor levels.





Hall Barn conceals many secrets highlighted for the first time thanks to detailed examination and recording. Details of its carpentry single the timber frame out as an outstanding example of late medieval craftsmanship.

Many of the beams carry carpenter's marks which directed the assembly of the king post frame. The production of a framed building of this quality occurred in a carpenter's workshop and yard. The majority of timbers would be marked with a sequence of digits to enable the whole frame and complex joints to be


reassembled on site. Marks identified within the frame of Hall Barn consist of at least four different types. These include early scratched designs of medieval origin, scratches across the timbers, short well defined chisel and gouge marks and less conventional incised designs.


Additional features of great significance were also discovered within the timber frame. These apotropaic or 'evil averting' marks were used to protect a building from evil spirits, witches or their animal familiars.

At Dronfield Hall Barn a tiny hexafoil daisy wheel was discovered on a beam above one of the threshing doors. A true daisy wheel depicts a circle containing six flower petals. It is an ancient image that can be traced back to the 6th century when it was used as a symbol for the sun. From 15th century it was associated with Christ, explaining its common usage in churches. A hexafoil is often found on the jambs of blocked openings and on the plaster panels of barns. In agricultural buildings, the daisy wheel has been used as a protection symbol for grain tithes being stored.

Along with the daisy wheel, Dronfield Hall Barn has several deliberate tallow burn marks. These were placed on strategic timbers before the building was constructed to protect the structure from fire.



April provided extraordinary opportunities for discovery at Dronfield Hall Barn. Professionals from Archaeological Research Services Ltd were on site conducting extensive excavation and investigation, trying to uncover the story behind the building. Archaeologist Alvaro was joined by an enthusiastic group of volunteer diggers from the local community. Together, they delved into the mysterious past of Hall Barn...











As a condition of planning consent, Dronfield Heritage Trust was required to excavate inside Hall Barn in search of clues about the medieval origin of the timber frame. Digging began in early April in cold dark conditions! Volunteers and professionals alike spent many hours on their knees painstakingly scraping off layers of buried history. All trenches were sited in the eastern end of the barn where possible medieval deposits were discovered in test pits sunk in 2009.

Two large trenches gradually revealed their secrets, with a substantial drainage feature discovered running diagonally through the building and an impressive early wall seeming to disappear underneath the existing structure. A stone stylobate supporting the magnificent principle post was exposed and a mixture of pottery fragments recovered, with some possibly dating from the mid to late medieval. Speculation and mystery deepened with the discovery of a 'gravestone' slab set beneath the threshing floor. It had been rumoured that the Quaker Chapel grounds next door to Hall Barn became the final resting place for some souls. Could one of them be buried in the barn?

The large stone had a shaped edge and smooth face ideal for inscription. After a week of teasing volunteers about the apparent headstone, and scaring visiting school children, Alvaro and project volunteer Paul lifted the 'gravestone' on the final day of digging! Despite the anticipation, a quick dust down and flash of torch light revealed no lettering on the underside so the stone was laid to rest once more. Thankfully, the only body unearthed was that of a long deceased cow, the bones of which caused some fascination for younger visitors!


A photographic and drawn record of each trench was taken before digging ceased, creating a lasting record of the archaeology beneath Hall Barn.


Meanwhile, outside Hall Barn, volunteers took charge of our large trench located close to the main gates. This exposed remains of a farmhouse fronting onto High Street, a reminder of the later agricultural history of the barn we see today. Fragments of clay pipe, blue wall plaster, stone steps and an interior wall were all discovered in the trench, together with a mystery stone lined feature in the North West corner. Although these findings are relatively modern, this trench was believed to be our best hope of finding structural evidence and something tangible to show visitors. The farmhouse which once stood here is preserved in living memory. As volunteers uncovered its remains, passers-by stopped to chat about their memories of the building still standing in the 1960's. 

As digging drew to a close, over 500 local school pupils aged 7-12 visited Hall Barn for exciting and engaging experiences of archaeology.

Members of the Dronfield Heritage Project management group were supported by a fantastic team of community volunteers, who collectively donated over 400 hours to ensure every school pupil and staff member had an enjoyable and worthwhile experience.

Whilst at the barn, students enjoyed seeing professional archaeologist Alvaro at work in the trenches, before conducting their own outdoor excavations in search of exciting artefacts! Many accepted the challenge of 'refitting analysis' helping to piece together and reconstruct a range of broken pots. Volunteers were on hand to explain the mysterious hexafoil daisy wheel secretly carved in Hall Barn and tell the story of the transition from medieval timber building to 17th century agricultural use.

Many spectacular finds were pulled from test pits and excellent suggestions offered about the purpose of features discovered in the farmhouse trench!

On their return to school, pupils from Northfield and St Andrews Schools produced colourful artwork reflecting upon their experiences, including recreating striking daisywheel symbols.







#### Dendrodating Dronfield Woodhouse Hall

Whilst researching medieval Dronfield, David Hey experienced the extraordinary accuracy of dendrochronology - the dating of building timbers through the analysis of tree ring data. Core samples are drilled from wooden beams and results collected by laboratory assessment and comparison with a database of existing results.



Dendrochronology - How Does it Work?

Most trees develop one growth ring each year reflecting the climatic conditions during which the new wood formed. Drought can result in a very narrow ring, whilst alternating periods of wet and dry weather can result in several rings forming over a single year. Missing growth rings are very rare, though have been known to occur in oak trees during 1816 the 'Year Without a Summer.' Temporary climatic cooling peaked during the summer of 1816 following the explosive eruption of the Tamboro volcano. 150 million tonnes of dust was ejected into the atmosphere, causing prolonged rain and cold conditions throughout England.

Dendrochronology samples measure the width of annual growth rings and compare this data to a comprehensive historical sequence in a technique known as cross dating. Building timbers can be dated to give an indication of when the tree was alive, growing and when it was felled, often providing a precise date for the construction of a building based on historic carpentry techniques.

One of the most interesting historic houses in the Dronfield district is Dronfield Woodhouse Hall, the home of Hal and Ruth Spencer. From the outside it looks to have been built in two stages during the seventeenth century, but hidden away inside are the substantial remains of a much earlier cruck-framed building. Encouraged by the owners and by Ruth's mother, Dr Joan Dils, who has written extensively about the local history of Reading and Berkshire, Stanley Jones has made a detailed architectural survey and David Hey has searched the relevant archives. Now, thanks to the wonderful technique of dendrochronology, we have a firm date for the building and we know who built it.

On 15 July 2013 Robert Howard of the Nottingham Tree-ring Dating Laboratory came to Dronfield Woodhouse Hall. He is seen here using his drill to obtain core samples from the timber frame. The results were remarkable. They showed that the trees were all from the same general patch of woodland and that they were all felled in 1533, except for one piece of timber that had already been classified on stylistic grounds as being a later addition. The purlin shown in the photograph retains all its sapwood, in other words it has the last ring that was produced by the tree before it was cut down. It is well known that medieval carpenters used green timbers instead of seasoning them, so the timber frame would have been constructed within a few months of the felling.

This firm date identified the builder as Mr Thomas Barley, a junior member of the Barleys of Barlow Hall, the leading gentry family in Dronfield's ancient parish. Surviving documents show that he was here in 1520 and 1537 and that he leased the hall and its farm from the parish Guild of St Mary and St John the Baptist, the major landowners in the Gosforth Valley. So, the powerful tool of dendrochronology has cast a bright new light on the medieval history of Dronfield.


It is hoped dendrochronology could be used to precisely date timbers inside Hall Barn, adding to archaeological and research findings. This will perhaps enable Dronfield Heritage Trust to also discover who built our magnificent king post frame!





In their 23<sup>rd</sup> year, Dronfield Woodhouse Well Dressing Group kindly chose to support the Heritage Trust through a vibrant and modern design unveiled in July (12th –19th).

Farm animals, crop bunches and the evil averting daisy wheel symbol carved in Hall Barn all featured in the traditional craft display. Flower petals, seeds, cones and twigs were painstakingly pressed into a clay covered board in a practise believed to date from Victorian times. Many sources suggest that well dressing developed from a pagan custom of making offerings to the gods of wells and springs to ensure a continued supply of fresh water. Well dressing in Derbyshire took on a special significance during the 17th century, as various villages gave thanks for their deliverance from the plague. In the last few decades this traditional art form has enjoyed a significant revival with a large number of well dressings available to view throughout Derbyshire between May and September.

The peaceful site of the old Town Well had two dressings, the main one dedicated to Dronfield Hall Barn and a second produced by the Girl Guides to represent the 'Well Dressing Song.' Dronfield Heritage Trust wishes to thank all members of the Dronfield Woodhouse Well Dressing Group for choosing to support us. A very welcome £231 was raised to fund our continued work. 




